### **1 Reports from Parish organisations**

#### **St Wenna's Church**

St Wenna's Church St Wenna's Church St Wenna's Church is part of the Looe Valley Benefice, where the partner churches of Looe, Duloe, Herodsfoot and Morval work together but maintain separate identities. The Clergy and local worship team are able to maintain services every Sunday and on the fifth week they will join with other churches.

The conversion of the side aisle into St Wenna's Chapel (for use when required on Sundays) and St Wenna's Community Room (for use as required on other days) has been completed and the chapel was formally dedicated by the new Bishop of Truro during a pastoral visit and communion service.

During the past year, church members ran a stall at the Morval Country Fete. Over the first weekend of October, we celebrated Harvest Festival and the story of Saint Wenna. The story was interspersed Celtic poetry, and there were Harvest songs, the chance to listen to some original music and a bring and share Harvest Supper. Everyone was welcomed again to an informal Harvest Family Service the following day, and on both days, there were opportunities to donate to the local Foodbank and to the Red Cross Gaza appeal.

On Remembrance Sunday, there was the usual Act of Remembrance at the Morval War Memorial followed by a Service of Remembrance in St Wenna's. In December, the Carol Service and Trenode School's Christingle service were also held here.

This year, we explored the idea of offering a Prayer meeting in Widegates Village Hall for an hour, for anyone who might wish to attend. On Easter Saturday and Easter Monday, there was a Cross Crafts exhibition with refreshments in church.

Recently Mr & Mrs Wilks opened their gardens at Churchtown as a fundraiser for St Luke's Hospice, where visitors could enjoy themselves strolling around the grounds. Church members helped in the gardens and also provided a fine selection of cakes and quiche, with teas & coffee. Half the money raised by these refreshments was donated to St Lukes Hospice.
