## The Forest for Cornwall has reached a key milestone of more than 600,000 trees planted since it was launched four years ago – the equivalent of a tree for every resident in Cornwall.

The Forest for Cornwall now spans approximately 600 hectares across woodland, parks, community spaces, gardens and farms improving residents' access to nature and absorbing carbon emissions to help slow climate

Over the summer months, the council is calling on residents to keep watering and looking after the trees they have planted, as well as start planning for the next planting season this autumn.

The Forest for Cornwall team have put together some tips for watering and looking after trees: Regular watering is important for newly planted trees

Remove weeds and grass from around the tree by hand Check stakes, ties and guards to see if they need adjusting

- Keep mulch levels topped up around the tree to help prevent soil drying
- out and reduce weed growth






